Greetings everyone,

On behalf of the Friends of Collier Reserve, I wish to express our strong opposition to the proposed WASP Hockey development at Collier Reserve and urge the Council to support the officer's recommendation not to grant an option to lease on any portion of Collier Reserve to Wesley South Perth Hockey Club (WASPs).

The **Friends of Collier Reserve** is a community group dedicated to preserving the public open space, natural environment and wildlife at Collier Reserve and its surrounding areas. Over **nearly three years**, we have engaged with **hundreds of residents** in Como and the neighbouring suburbs.

This engagement has consistently shown strong opposition to the proposed WASP development, as demonstrated by the **petition** we submitted and referenced in the officer's report.

Unlike the club's survey feedback, this petition can be verified and accurately reflects widespread opposition, as evidenced by the **359 signatures from City of South Perth electors**. It also contradicts the suggestions made by some councillors that the opposition is limited to a few residents living opposite the park.

Cr Coveney, who made this assertion, went on further to say that a South Perth community page on social media, presumably Facebook, 'attracted support for WASP 3:1' and claimed that you 'couldn't ask for more evidence about community sentiment'.

Given my experience working with **social media specialists** and **data analysts** as part of a **community engagement team**, I would **caution** Cr. Coveney against relying on Facebook comments, as they are not considered reliable data. Rather than focusing on the **opinions of a few 'keyboard warriors'**, councillors should base their decisions on **the facts**.

As you may be aware, the City is in the process of developing a new Public Open Space strategy, and the current draft figures reveal a significant shortfall in our local POS. The district has approximately **4% POS**, while Como has even less **at 2.97%**. This is starkly below the recommended level of **10%**, representing a shortfall of approximately **60% across the City and 70% in Como**.

The shortage of POS is already a pressing issue and will only worsen with increased urban infill. Yet, despite widespread concern, some councillors continue to **hold the outdated belief** that every club is entitled to **its own single-use facility.** While allocating land exclusively to community groups may have been feasible in the past, this practice is **no longer sustainable**.

We are all familiar with the club's **narrative**, supported by the catchy **tagline 'WASP wants a home'**, which, concerningly, some councillors have adopted in their campaign for the club. Cr. Waugh's Notice of Motion is a **prime example**.

It needs to be pointed out that **WASP** is **not homeless**. They already have an established home at Richardson Reserve, complete with a 21-year lease, a clubroom, and access to six grass pitches. The oval is also set to receive a \$1.3 million sports lighting upgrade and \$740,000 in changeroom improvements.

Their need for synthetic turf can be met at the future \$135 million High
Performance Hockey Centre at Curtin University, which will have four synthetic
turfs that WASP can use for all their home games. The centre will also offer worldclass amenities, including shared clubrooms and activity spaces for socialising, and
opportunities to display club memorabilia, allowing them to retain their identity.

Despite the ample provisions at Richardson Reserve and the new centre, WASP insists on having its own **expensive**, **all-in-one facilities at Collier Reserve**.

They are not just seeking a new **'home'**; they are pursuing a premium **'dream home'** at the expense of the entire community.

As demonstrated by the **numerous deputations** made tonight by community members and the strong representations from community groups – including:

the City of South Perth Residents' Association, Salter Point Community Group, South Perth Tree Canopy Advocates, and South Perth United Football Club –

their pursuit of this **dream 'home'** disregards the diverse needs of the broad community, which are currently being met by Collier Reserve.

This vital greenspace provides a range of sporting, recreational, and nature opportunities, all of which are crucial for supporting **mental and physical well-being**, **fostering social cohesion**, and creating a **strong sense of belonging**.

Allocating 12,000m² of land to the club for exclusive use would reduce the accessible active open space by 43%. This substantial loss would not only undermine fair access to this vital community resource but also diminish the reserve's ability to meet the city's growing demand for sports spaces, particularly for the cricket, baseball, and soccer clubs that currently use the oval.

This loss of accessible public open space is especially concerning for the local area, since nearby land in **Kensington is slated for high-density development**, which would likely increase the demand for public open spaces and further **strain scarce community resources**.

At the February Ordinary Council meeting, several councillors made bold statements about their commitment to representing our community.

Cr. Coveney asserted that it was his job to 'represent our community, all of them, not just the loudest'.

Cr. Prendiville emphasised that she was 'elected on the promise of listening to the community and responding to their needs'.

And Cr. Waugh said she cares 'about our community's needs,' and thinks it's time for South Perth to 'level up.'

This raises the question: **exactly which community are you referring to?**

The City of South Perth has **over 46,000 residents**, with more than **14,000 living in Como alone**. In contrast, WASP has fewer than **800 members**, with **less than 400** residing in the district.

It's clear that the **five elected members** who supported the option to lease motion and revived the WASP agenda **DID NOT listen to the community or represent the broader needs and interests of all residents.**

It's time for these councillors to 'level up' and restore public trust by voting decisively against the option to lease.
